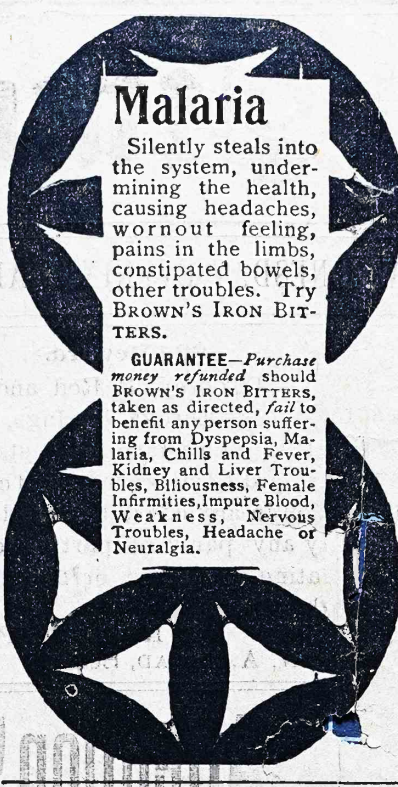

### DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY.

Pursuant to a meeting of the Democratic Central Committee of Carroll County, Arkansas, held at Berryville on March 16, 1896, it was ordered that the following be held:

Saturday, June 6, 1896,

for the purpose of nominating State and County officers, United States Senator, Congressmen and Electing Attorney, said primary to be held in accordance with the Australian ballot system.

None but Democrats who are legal voters shall be allowed to vote and no voter shall be permitted to vote outside of his township or precinct. Election judges are especially requested to see that this rule is strictly adhered to.

The returns of said election in each township shall be made to the Democratic Committee at the court house in said county and delivered to the chairman by one of the judges of said election by 10 o'clock on the 10th day of June, 1896, when and where the Central Committee will count the votes of said primaries in the presence of all who wish to be present and declare the result. The person receiving a plurality of all the votes cast in the county at said primary election for which he was voted shall be by said committee declared the nominee for that office.

Any person having good cause may challenge a voter and if the decision of the judges be not satisfactory will have the right to appeal to this committee.

Said primary election to be conducted and held by the persons who are hereby appointed judges thereof for the several townships for which they are named.

If any of the judges or clerks hereby appointed fail to attend or refuse to act, then the Democratic voters

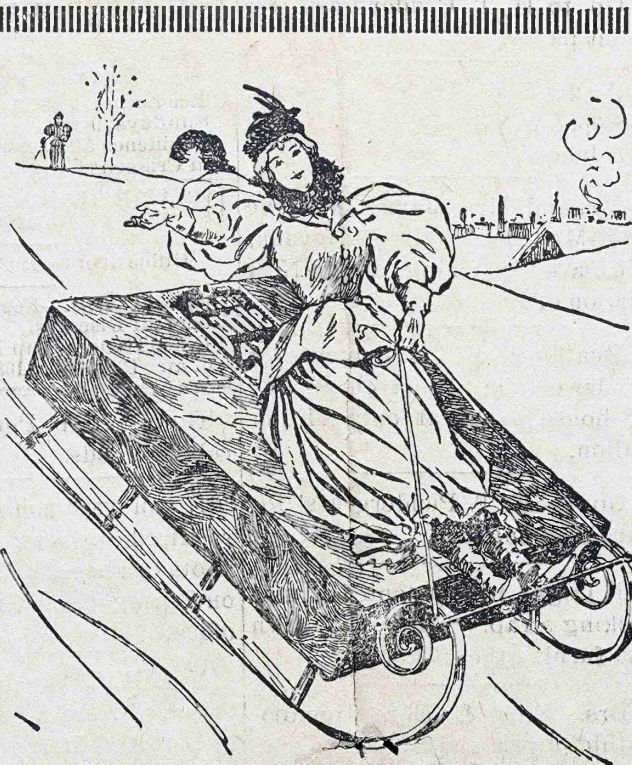
