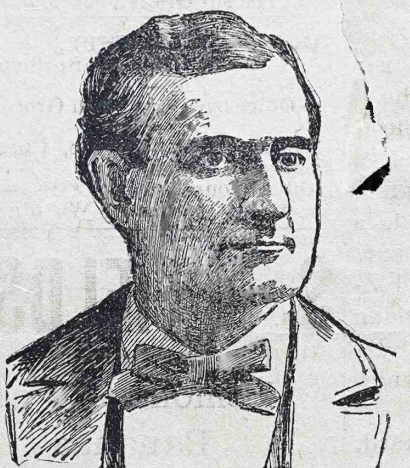

Another Armenian Massacre

One thousand helpless Armenians have been massacred at Midke. Such is the latest news from Constantinople; and with it comes the other statement that the war cloud which has hung over Europe for some months has vanished.

The *Czar* and *Lord Salisbury* have reached an agreement by which, if the Sultan shows himself capable of maintaining order in his kingdom, the European Powers will not forcibly interfere in Turkish affairs.

The massacre shows what the maintenance of order in Turkey means. It means the continued slaughter of the Armenians, with possibly the murder or explosion of foreign missionaries and all the other arbitrary and inhuman acts which have shocked the world in the last few months.

It is idle to suppose that the atrocities will cease. The Sultan has bid defiance to the Powers of Europe. For eighteen months now massacre has followed massacre, till at last they have been carried into Constantinople and committed under the eyes of the Sultan and of the diplomatic representatives of England and other European countries.

Still the Powers have declined to forcibly interfere. The Sultan has triumphed over European diplomacy. The Armenians are to be left to their fate, by England, Germany, France and Russia, and even the few who have been fortunate enough to escape from the fate which so many of their fellows have met are to be barred from the United States, in which they had hoped to exercise their religious faith with freedom and to live by honest industry.

It looks as if the time had arrived when selfish interest has destroyed a sense of humanity or justice among nations.

Leap Year is Passing.

Passaic City (N. J.) Record. The summer is gone and autumn is upon us, yet there are many marriageable young women who have not availed themselves of the traditional privilege which leap year grants. That on every fourth year it is proper that the advances looking to matrimony should be feminine is not mere folklore, but the principle has in more countries than one been incorporated into the law of the land. Not only so, but any man whose hand was thus sought in marriage was obliged, under severe penalties, to give it. The Scottish Parliament, for instance, passed in 1288 the following: "It is statut and ordaint that during the reign of his mairt blissit Magneste, ilk for the yeare as Lepe yeare, ilk maiden ladye of baith the highe and lowe estaet shall hae liberte to bespeake ye man she likes, albeit gif he refuses ta talk hir to be his lawful wyfe, he shall be mulcted in ye sum of ane dundis or less, as his estate may me; except and awis gif he can make it appeare that he is betrothit ane ither woman, he then shall be free."

A law of similar import was enacted in France a few years later, and the custom is known to have had the sanction of the law in Florence and Genoa at the close of the fifteenth century. In a unique little volume published in London in the first decade of the seventh century, entitled "Love, Courtship and Matrimony" it is said of the feminine privilege: "Albeit it now becomes a part of the common law in regard to social relations of life, that as often as every leap year doth re-
