November Star-Showers.

St. Louis Republic.

In this age we are all supposed to take more or less interest in those branches of science which explain natural phenomena. Each of these various branches of human knowledge has its devotees, but the one branch which is the wonderland to all scientists is astronomy.

The astronomer of these crisp November nights can feast his eyes on celestial curios and allow his mind to wander far into the immeasurable depths of space. He can see, with his high-grade instruments, misty nebulae and far-off worlds that are never brought within the range of mortal's unassisted vision.

The gigantic ball upon which we live is at present passing that point in the great sea of space where its orbit intersects the orbit of an immense swarm of meteors. We are now at the celestial cross-roads, as it were, and the result is a beautiful exhibition of shooting stars which can be seen by the star-gazers of every portion of the world when atmospheric conditions are favorable.

Those objects which we call "shooting stars" are individual meteors which have dropped from the great swarm and which have become ignited by coming in contact with our atmosphere. Our earth moves through space with a speed of 98,000 feet per second. That being an established fact, it is not at all necessary to give reasons why broken bits of rocks, nuggets, etc., should take fire upon coming in contact with the outer envelope of the great sea of air which surrounds our planet.

The November train of meteors is a vast aggregation of broken bits of ruined worlds, wrecked comets, vapor, smoke and gas. It flies through space in a regular orbit, moving at the rate of about a million miles each twenty-four hours. Yet this vast collection of inorganic substances is so great that it takes eight of our years for it to pass a given point in the heavens. Moreover, the distance through it is estimated to be upwards of 100,000 miles in the heaviest portion of the "swarm."

The contact which is now on is only with the vanguard. Next November they will appear as shooting stars in much greater numbers, increasing yearly until 1899, when it is expected that we

shall have a "star shower" to that of 1833.

The astronomers say that these meteors which cause the phenomena which we refer to as "shooting stars" are of all sizes, from that of a sand grain up to immense blocks of stone weighing several tons. These latter are not entirely consumed by striking our atmosphere, but fall to the earth as aerolites or meteorites. No one knows why they collect in such immense swarms and shoot off through space like comets. But the knowledge of their existence and of the fact that they sail in and out among the planets without harming them in the least teaches us that they are sustained and guided by an all-wise power which does everything for His own glorification and in order to show His greatness and power to the beings He has created.

Text Books.

Arkansas Democrat.

The state of California has tried the system of publishing its own text books, and has found the experiment very expensive and entirely unsatisfactory. It has cost the state several hundred thousand dollars, and the result attained only show that a big mistake was made when the first appropriation was made. After a trial of seven years a committee on text books from the state teachers' association presents the following conclusions:

First. State publication up to the present time has not furnished as cheap text books as the friends of the plan expected.

Second. State publication under the policy pursued by the state board of education has failed to produce text books up to a proper standard in binding, illustration, grading and adaptability.

Third. The method followed in the compilation of the state books is impracticable, and not calculated to produce the best results.

ELIMINATING SEEDS.

Raising Seedless Fruit—Thorns to Be Cast Aside.

"Appendicitis may not be so common as it is now," said Assistant Pomologist Taylor. "Gardeners are trying their best to get rid of seeds in fruits. Already we have a navel orange, which is nearly always seedless. Some varieties of apples have been produced that have almost no seeds. They are abnormalities. Sometimes they are called 'bloodless,' because the blossoms have no petals, and in some cases lack stamens. The core is very small, and commonly there is a hollow at the end opposite the stem. These seedless apples are generally poor in flavor, being grown merely as curiosities.

"Raisin producers in California are trying to obtain seedless grapes for raisins. The object in view is to get size and seedlessness in the same fruit. You are familiar with the seedless grapes of Corinth, which are commonly known as 'currants.' The Sultana raisins of southeastern Europe are likewise seedless grapes. Both of these varieties are now cultivated in California, but they are small. A prominent grower in Fresno county is working in this direction with the Muscat of Alexandria, which is the leading raisin grape of California. He selects cuttings from those vines which produce less than the normal number of seeds. Continuing this process from year to year, he hopes to reduce the grapes to absolute seedlessness eventually. It is believed that the seedlessness of the Corinth and Sultana grapes was obtained by similar means.

"The banana is seedless, and has been so for centuries, though nobody knows why. It is propagated by suckers, and possibly it had no seeds when it was first found in the wild state. The banana is a modified berry. Cutting the fruit down through the middle, you will sometimes see a few little brown spots, which are rudimentary seeds. The pineapple is nearly seedless, being propagated likewise from suckers and from slips. The eggplant, which is a fruit, botanically speaking, is occasionally seedless. This plant is able to produce developed fruit, whether the blossoms are fertilized or not.

"Horticulturists are endeavoring at the same time to rid fruit plants of thorns. Some oranges and lemons are very thorny—for example, the high-priced king orange, which is the best of the mandarins. It is rarely seen in this market. The first trees were brought to this country from Cochinchina. In Florida its thorniness has been diminished by selecting buds from branches with the fewest thorns. Thorns are objectionable because they punctuate the oranges and lemons when the branches are blown about by the wind.

"Efforts are being made to get rid of the thorns on raspberry plants, simply for convenience in picking the fruit. The thorns are intended by nature to protect the plants from animals. Cultivators select those plants which by chance happen to be thornless, or comparatively so."—Washington Star.

HEAT INDESCRIBABLE.

Would Be the Result if Two Stars Should Come into Collision.

Prof. Ledger, of London, whose series of Gresham astronomy lectures on "Knocks in Their Relation to Astronomy" has just been completed, in his last discourse pointed out that the universe, instead of being fixed, is alive with motion, each star with its attendant planets hurrying through space. If star were to knock against star, the intense heat and fire generated by the enormous velocity and vast momentum of the two masses would be such as to pass human conception.

It may be that the sun was formed by the collision of two stars. The effect of two such bodies attracting each other and meeting would be to reduce them to a violently agitated mass, which would oscillate, first inward, producing inconceivable heat, and then outward again, ultimately assuming the condition of the sun. The general result would be that the two bodies, would revolve around their common center of gravity—that is to say, around each other—creating a double star. Lord Kelvin has calculated that, if twenty-nine million solid globes, each of the mass of the moon, should be scattered over a spherical surface one hundred times the radius of the earth's orbit, they would come together and be raised to a temperature of one hundred thousand degrees. They would oscillate outward and inward, reaching to a less distance each time, and ultimately settling down to a sphere.

The nebulae we see around us, may, Prof. Ledger suggests, have been produced by the knocking together of two great bodies rather than by the aggregation of many smaller ones. The collision of two huge suns would thus lead to rejuvenescence and the formation of new systems. Phenomena indicating that something very much in the nature of a collision had occurred are the outbursts of temporary stars such as those observed by Tycho Brahe in 1572, by Kepler in 1604, and those of 1848, 1866, 1876, 1885 and 1892—the last being the new star Auriga, which declined through ten magnitudes, or became one hundred thousand times less bright, in two months. The great increase in the light of a comet as it approaches the sun may be due to a tidal disturbance in the bodies forming it, causing them to knock against each other, and thus generate heat and light.

In the same way, the twinkling of the stars may be caused by the knocks of the molecules of the atmosphere on the ether, whose undulations carry their light to us. The excessively great and the exceedingly small are all independent, and the past, present, and probable future of nebulous bodies all hinge on the relations they bear to the knocks of the molecules of their gases, while the knocks of immense bodies depend ultimately on the knocks of their constituent atoms.—Chicago News.
