The indications are that the number of candidates for the various places to be given out by the two houses of the next general assembly will be largely in excess of the number who have applied heretofore.

It is the privilege of every citizen to offer for these places, but the fact remains that many are destined to be disappointed. In many cases members are themselves responsible for the candidacy of individuals who have no chance whatever to succeed.

It is unfair to traffic on the credulity of some good fellow, and make him believe that he can be elected to a lucrative position when, in fact, he will have no chance in the struggle.

There will probably be 250 candidates in the capital city when the Legislature convenes, and less than thirty will be successful. Of the whole number at least 100 will have no chance to win when they start in the race. It would be a real kindness for members to tell them what they might expect in the first place and not encourage them to spend their time and money in a fruitless contest.

We say this without reference to any particular county or district, and the suggestion is quite as applicable to Pulaski County as any other county in the State. The persons who win legislative positions are usually hustlers, and besides possessing ability they must necessarily have strong backing.

In a number of counties there are three and four candidates for the same place. This is true of Pulaski County. The members and senators in such counties are hampered and embarrassed. Being unwilling to suggest the withdrawal of any one of the


