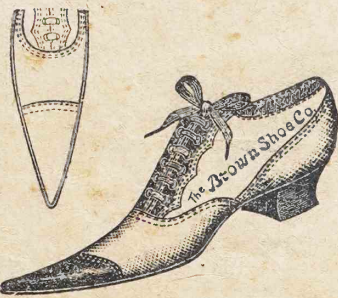

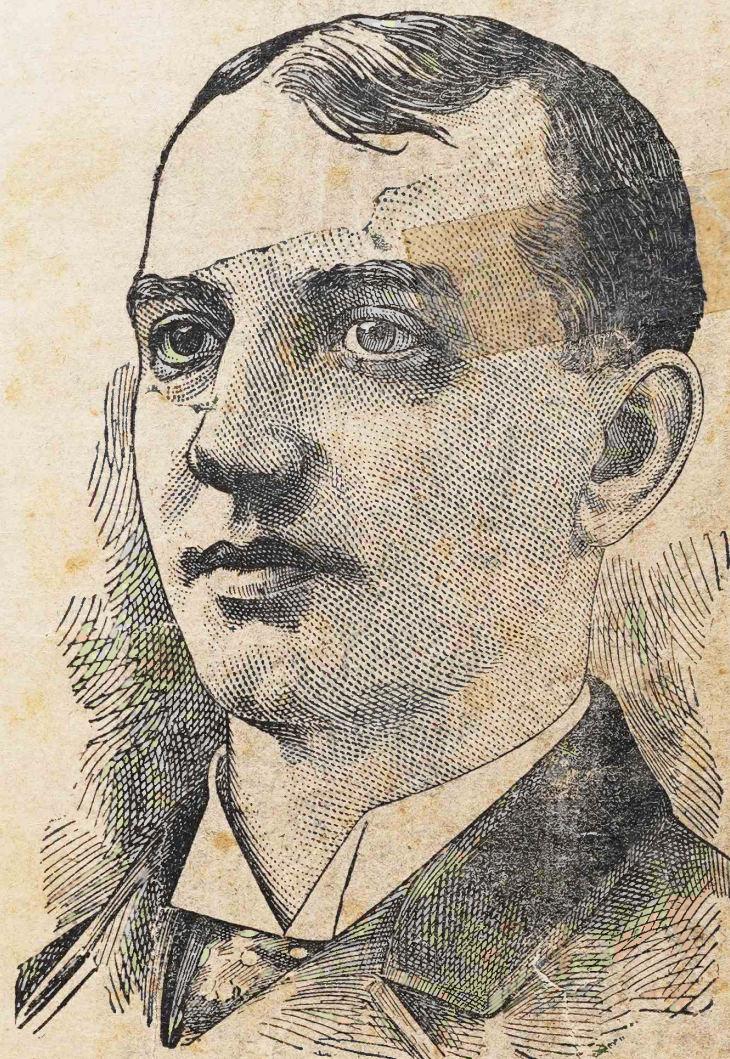
I see Mr. Freeman hastens to

for twenty days in the field with

that boasts that he is the choice
of a people for an office, and is
afraid to put his name on a
ticket with other candidates for
the approval, gives the lie to
his assertions? Mr. Rosewater
gave his reasons for not going
in the primary that men would
vote that did not amount to

his petition and see what he has
left.He made the assertion before
the committee at Berryville that
of twenty-nine Republicans in
business in Eureka Springs,

him for postmaster. In looking
over the poll books I find that

Is Eureka Springs, Ark.—Facts About This Favorite Health Resort.

INTERESTING MATTER

LOCATION.

NESTLED among the pine clad mountains of Northwest Arkansas is this city of "magic waters," where thousands from every portion of our country have eagerly sought rest and health. Here it was that the sick and wounded soldiers of the Confederacy sought the waters of the now famous Basin Spring, little dreaming that the waters that so rapidly healed their wounds and brought health to their sick, would, one day, be the Mecca toward which the sick and afflicted would journey. Here it is that hundreds upon hundreds have since that time found health and rest; and many are the miraculous cures that have been made by these wonderful waters.

What was then a wilderness is now a permanent city of 5,000 people, with its churches, schools, imposing stone and brick business blocks, splendid bath houses, beautiful residences, bank, many fine hotels, electric street railway, etc.

This is the record, and, incredible as it may seem, it is due to the health and life-giving waters of the now famous Eureka Springs.

THEIR DISCOVERY.

IT MAY not be out of place to mention the discovery of these springs: There are good reasons for believing that both Ponce de Leon and De Soto visited these springs in search of the mythical "Fountain of Youth," but they were driven back by the Indians, so jealous of this region, believed by them to be sacred to the Great Spirit. The more recent history of these springs begins with their discovery by Dr. Alvah Jackson, one of the earliest pioneers of Carroll County. One day while hunting, Dr. Jackson's hounds chased a panther into a small opening in a rocky bluff. One of the dogs was caught in the cave, the body of the slain panther lying in the only opening by which the dog could make his escape.

While breaking away the rock that the dog might be freed, dust flew into the eyes of Dr. Jackson's son, a boy who had long suffered with granulated sore eyes. Dr. Jackson advised his son to wash his eyes in the water of a spring near by. The water so quickly relieved the pain that he afterwards returned for another supply. After several trips his eyes were entirely cured.

The first man to herald to the world the good tidings of the curative properties of the springs was Judge Saunders, a friend of Dr. Jackson. His gratitude for his restoration to health was unbounded, and wherever he went he spread the good news. Judge Saunders' visit was made in the spring of 1879—twenty-three years after the discovery of the spring by Dr. Jackson. On the fourth of July, 1879, a large number of people were camped around the Basin Spring, and on this occasion the place was named Eureka. The camp grew rapidly and soon sprang up a city whose growth had been as by magic. By October, 1880, the number of resident population and health-seekers was several thousand.

CLIMATE.

THE Climate at Eureka Springs is never oppressively hot, even in mid-summer, and the uniformly cool night give quiet, refreshing sleep. This fact is of vast im-

The waters of the one, as the name indicates, are hot, while those of Eureka Springs are cold. Hot Springs is in Central Western Arkansas, while Eureka Springs is in the extreme Northwestern corner of the State—180 miles distant, "as the crow flies." Hot Springs is among the foot hills of the Ozark Mountains, with an altitude of 610 feet, while Eureka Springs is on the crest of the same range, with an altitude of 2,000 feet. Hot Springs has an annual precipitation of 72.28 inches (average for three years), while that of Eureka Springs is 32.79 inches. The mean annual temperature of Hot Springs is 61.57°; of Eureka Springs, 58.93°. The summer mean at Hot Springs, 81.57°; of Eureka Springs, 74.79°. The average number of clear days at Hot Springs is 162; at Eureka Springs, 209. Thus the meteorological record shows that a marked difference exists between the two places in those characteristics which go to make up climate.

ANALYSIS.

THE waters of a number of these springs have been analyzed by analytical chemists of the highest reputation. We give the analysis of the Basin Spring, which was both quantitative and qualitative. These analyses were made by Profs. Potter and Riggs, of Washington University, St. Louis, Mo., and by Messrs. Wright & Merrell, St. Louis, Mo. These gentlemen are chemists of eminence and ability. Each gallon of 231 cubic inches contains the following, viz:

The gaseous contents, as ascertained by Prof. Juan H. Wright, of the firm of Wright & Merrell, is 28.52 cubic inches in each gallon of water. It is worthy of note that the gaseous contents of the water of Eureka Springs are remarkable from the fact that there is a large proportion of nitrogen. The large proportion of nitrogen is proof of a proportionately large amount of oxygen.

The solid and gaseous elements contained in these springs can be compared with other popular springs by referring to the following table:

In a paper read before the World's Congress of Medico-Climatology at Chicago, May, 1893, the following true facts were stated:

First. Pure water is the greatest solvent in nature.

Second. Pure water in sufficient quantity is the hardest thing to find in nature.

Third. Water is the largest single factor in healthy digestion, assimilation and excretion.

Regarding Points of Interest, Springs, Hotel Accommodations, Etc.

A Correct Description of the Improved and to be Made.—Some New Enterprises Started.

SPRINGS.

FOR the benefit of our readers, we give below a partial list of the principal springs in Eureka Springs; also, their location and other general information regarding them. There are many features connected with these springs that space forbids our mentioning and which nothing but a visit to them can give an adequate idea.

The Basin Spring, the first discovered, and which derives its name from the basin-shaped cavity in the rock from which the water was formerly dipped, but is now enclosed in masonry, and can be seen about ten feet below the present grade. It is located in the central part of the city, near the junction of Spring and Main Streets. It is the most popular spring in the city. If you want to find a resident or visiting friend in the city, go in the evening to the Basin, you are sure to find him.

The Magnetic Spring, the second in the city, and which is so noted for its curative powers, is in the northern part of the city, on Magnetic Street east from Main Street.

The Sweet Spring, on Spring Street, near the junction of Spring and Pine Streets.

The Harding Spring is situated on Spring Street, near Howell Street south of German Alley.

The Crescent Spring is on Spring Street below the Crescent Hotel and opposite the Presbyterian Church.

The Grotto Spring is on the Boulevard in the northern part of the city.

The Dairy Spring is situated at the point where Fuller Street crosses the line of section 10.

The State Normal and Educational Assembly building is now erected, on the Boulevard north of J. W. Hill's cottage.

The Cold Spring is situated on North Main Street, south of Magnetic Street.

The Little Eureka Spring is situated in the southeast part of the city, on Steel Street.

The Maxwell Spring is near the junction of Douglass and Eagle Streets.

The Mystic Spring is located in the northeast part of the city in the Magnetic Hollow, quarter of a mile above the Magnetic Spring.

The Ozark Spring is at the junction of Ozark and Armstrong Streets.

The Oil Spring. This romantic spot is one mile southwest. The spring runs out of a very rugged cliff of rocks. There is a nice cave just above the spring, which is very interesting to pleasure seekers.

The Table Rock Spring is situated on West Main Street, near the junction of Armstrong Street.

The Laundry Spring is situated in the southeast part of the city on Steel Street between Perrin Street and Berryville Avenue.

The Soldier Spring is situated on East Mountain, at the old marble quarry, between East Mountain and Nut Streets.

The Alexander Spring is situated on Nut Street and Alexander Avenue.

The Ming Spring is situated near Douglass Street in Little Eureka Hollow above Cave Spring.

The Ozark Spring is situated in the eastern part of the city, on D. C. Bay's land south of Peck Street.

The Bauer Spring is in the southeast part of the city in Little Eureka Hollow above Ming and Cave Springs.

The Cave Spring is situated south of Maxwell Spring on the west side of Douglass Street.

The Arsenic Spring, with the arsenic left out, and as pure as crystal, is southwest of the city beyond Woodruff's planing mill. If you will start in the morning early, go to the Arsenic Spring, drink its water, climb the hill to Woodruff's planing mill, no matter about your dyspepsia, your stomach will tell you when it is dinner time.

POINTS OF INTEREST.

EUREKA SPRINGS has advantages that do not pertain to any other place. The mountain scenery, so peculiar to this portion of the Ozark range, the almost continuous sunshine with pleasant temperature, make it the ideal country

for horseback exercise. A number of stables keep constantly a full supply of saddle ponies that are trained to climb the mountain paths, sure-footed and fleet. Numerous objects of interest are to be found in the region within a radius of ten or fifteen miles: some of the most charming and extensive views from mountain tops. The view from Pond Mountain has been pronounced unequalled in the United States for beauty. Grand View, a point overlooking the winding valley of King's River and the sparkling Osage, is a picture once seen will never desert you. Pivot Rock, Bennet's Cave (called the Four Mile Cave), Blue Spring, Roaring River, and the Narrows and Cedar Cliffs on White River and Pea Ridge are some of the many attractions.

White and King's Rivers afford fine fishing.

The Onyx caves, situated about eight miles from the city; are most interesting points of interest.

The Sanatorium Lake and grounds, comprising nearly 1800 acres, is one of the attractions to the visitor. An excellent driveway has been made to these grounds, which are situated about two miles south of the city. The Lake, delightfully situated, is fed by more than twenty springs. Boat ing is a favorite pastime, and many other attractions are offered at this popular resort.

The electric street car line, two and one-half mile long, leading from the famous Basin Spring and passing many of the springs, hotels and churches, leads around the mountain to the Auditorium grounds, up the mountain to its very summit, passing the Crescent Hotel and running south to the Lindell Hotel. By this unique street car line, convenient access may be had to and from the larger part of the city, while its serpentine windings up the mountain side, along steep gulches and shaded ravines, are a perpetual delight to visitor and citizen.

PLACES OF AMUSEMENT.

VISITORS will find at Eureka Springs amusement of every description. There is hardly a time during the season that some form of entertainment is not given.

The Auditorium, situated on the Boulevard in the northern part of the city, is one of the finest amusement buildings in the South. Surrounding this immense building, which has a seating capacity of 3500, are beautiful and spacious grounds. A large stage, equipped with fine scenery, has been provided, and lectures, concerts, operas and dramatics are produced by the leading talent in the country. It is a most delightful amusement resort.

A comfortable and roomy Opera House, with a seating capacity of over 500, is situated on Main Street near the junction of Spring and Main Streets, and almost opposite the famous Basin Spring. This is also a pleasant resort and every form of entertainment is given during the year.

our city and a visit to these institutions will well repay one.

CONTEMPLATED IMPROVEMENTS.
A SANITARIUM, to be located at the picturesque Sanatorium grounds, already described in this article, is one of the contemplated improvements and will be built within a few years on a scale of grandeur equal to anything of its kind in the country.

Active work has already begun on the building of the International Teachers' Home Association, which will be situated on Magnetic Heights, a commanding position, giving a picturesque view for many miles of our beautiful city and surrounding country. Over \$150,000 will be expended in this work, and, when finished, will be one of the most attractive features of our city.

The Home for the Blue and the Gray, an organization which found its beginning in Eureka Springs, are contemplating the erection of a \$100,000 building, the site for which has not yet been determined upon. Congress has been asked for an appropriation for this building, and it is sure to meet with success.

Eureka Springs is never behind in public enterprises, and everything points to the securing of the Odd Fellows' Widows and Orphans' Home. Our citizens have made liberal offers and it is almost an assured fact that this institution will be located here.

EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES.
EUREKA SPRINGS has unquestionably the best schools in the State. These schools were awarded first premium at the World's Fair at Chicago in 1893, as being the best exhibit of a literature course given. Our public schools, continuing nine months in the year, are well graded, and the best of talent is secured. Thirteen teachers are employed, the greater number being graduates of normal schools. There are three school buildings, the central school being substantially built of brick, with all modern improvements. No contagious disease has ever appeared to cause any department of the schools to be closed for a single day in seven years. The visitor will find here as good a public school system as anywhere in the United States.

CHURCHES.

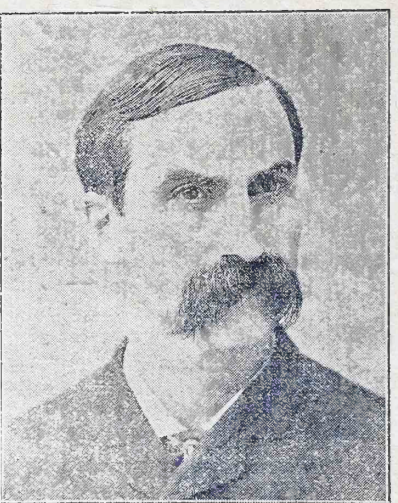
