## Arkansas and Eureka Springs at Omaha.

"The Arkansas party was increased this morning by the arrival of James T. Pomeroy of Eureka Springs, who stopped in Kansas City to attend the meeting of the Missouri Exposition commission and learn something of what Missouri intends to do. Mr. Pomeroy asserted most positively that the northwestern part of the State where he lives will be represented by an exhibit regardless of what the rest of the State may do.

"Our section is thoroughly aroused," said Mr. Pomeroy, "and we are going to have an exhibit. I accompanied the Missouri commission on its visit to Omaha and when I returned home and told our people of what the exposition was going to be they all agreed with me that we must make an exhibit and show the world what we have down there in the Ozark mountain country. We have made arrangements to reproduce one of our famous mineral springs and keep it supplied during the entire exposition and we are also going to have an exhibit of the fruits and other products which are grown in our section. If the State makes a general exhibit we will join with it and do all we can in the interest of a fine exhibit."—Omaha Bee February, 17.

Asked concerning the outlook for the Arkansas Exhibit at Omaha, Jas. T. Pomeroy said:

"The management has made concessions, as follows: Unlimited free space on which to erect a State building; 1,000 feet floor space, free and 3,000 feet additional, at half price, or 50 cents per foot—that is 4,000 feet for \$1,500.

"The original offer was \$1.00 per foot and 500 feet free. However, this 4,000 feet if accepted, must be distributed among the several departments in specific exhibit. No composite exhibit can be made in any departmental building.

"Composite Exhibit can only be made in State or private buildings, and section of such exhibit can not complete. For the latter reason, I believe it would be best for us to concentrate State competition effort on one line, and take all the (1,000 feet) free space in horticultural building. We can win in that snow, but I doubt if we could in any other department.

"Composite Exhibit would be the best for advertising our State resources, which consist, not so much in the marked excellence of any one, (unless it be fruit) as in their great diversity.

I no not believe in wasting our ammunition—\$1,500 cash and a large part of our collections—in the other departments, where we have little chance of success.

I believe in concentrating effort upon a State building. The executive committee has not as yet promulgated any plans for raising any monies in that direction.

From what investigations I have made, it would appear that to erect such a building as would be a credit to the State, and to fill it with a fairly representative exhibit of our resources would require, at the very least \$25,000 and a great deal of personal sacrifice in the way of time and money, on the part of a great many public spirited persons.

There is no question about the feasibility of the project, or the inestimable benefits to be derived therefrom.

It is only a question as to whether there are enough

patriotic people within the borders of Arkansas who will step to the front, and whether the executive committee will properly organize these workers, and promulgate such plans as will prove productive of practical results.

So for as Eureka Springs is concerned, she will be provided for whether the executive committee succeeds or fails. But I hope our people will take no sordid advantage of their good fortune.

Eureka Springs took the initiative so far as State effort is concerned, and when Mr. Richardson, the official lecturer for the Omaha management, opened his campaign in our city I hope to see the "glad hand" extended to him from the time he steps from the Frisco, at Seligman, until he departs thereon."

## A Call.

In pursuance of a call and instruction of the Democratic State central committee, a Democratic primary election is hereby called to be held at the voting place in the various townships, precincts and wards in Carroll county, Arkansas, on Saturday the 7th day of May, 1898, for the purpose of voting for candidates for State, district, county and township officers, and to select delegates on the same day to the county Democratic Convention which is hereby called to meet at the court house in the town of Berryville, said county, on Saturday, the 14th day of May, 1898, for the purpose of comparing the poll books and returns and declaring the result of said primary election for county officers, and certifying the vote cast for each candidate for State officer, to the secretary of State Democratic central committee, and the vote cast for Congress, Circuit Judge, Prosecuting Attorney and State Senator to the secretaries of the respective district committees and to elect delegates to the State Democratic Convention to be held at Little Rock on June 21st, 1898, and to elect a Democratic county central committee.

Said primary election to be a legal election and the result of said election to be binding on all persons of Arkansas.

All persons, irrespective of past party affiliations, who in good faith endorse the principles of the Democratic National and State platforms and who will support the nominees of the Democratic party are invited to participate in the Democratic primaries in this county.
