### The Electric Line.

A meeting of the Berryville and Eureka Springs committees, appointed to look after the survey of the proposed line, met at Dr. Floyd's office yesterday afternoon.

The Eureka Springs committee consisted of B. F. Putnam, R. G. Floyd and J. A. Bridgford and the Berryville committee of Alvin Bobo, J. P. Fancher, Dr. George and J. D. Hailey.

A joint committee was appointed, consisting of B. F. Putnam, president; J. P. Fancher, vice-president, and J. D. Hailey, secretary, to look after the joint interests of the two towns.

An executive committee, who will have charge of the survey, will engage an engineer and attend to distributing the funds, was appointed and consists of B. F. Putnam, J. W. Freeman and Dr. R. G. Floyd. This committee has, of course, made no arrangements as yet; no engineer has yet been hired, and no details have been arranged. The work will begin soon, however, and the starting point will be the depot, and it may be possible that several lines will have to be surveyed to find a feasible route to get out of town.

Interest seems to be developing in the railroad scheme away from here, especially at Kansas City and other places where capitalists reside who have large property interests in Newton and Searcy counties, and who are taking an active interest in the progress of the line.

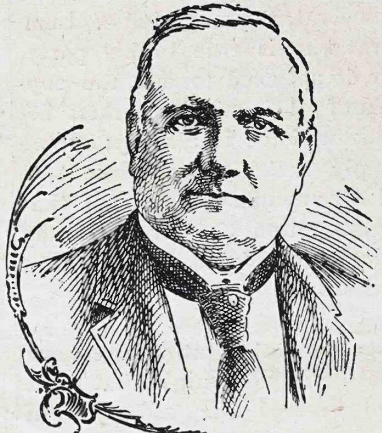

## To the Democrats.

THE TIMES-ECHO is recognized  
as the representative Democratic  
paper of the Western District, be-  
cause of its attitude in the last elec-  
tion and previous to that time has  
been an endorsement of the Chi-  
cago platform. It has never  
swerved from its course of duty,  
or hoisted any but a silver banner  
at its mast-head, and its present  
editor is a pronounced silver  
Democrat, the only kind of Dem-  
ocrat who is true to his party.  
We do not need to ask the sup-  
port of all loyal Democrats, be-  
cause we have it already; but we  
simply make this statement to  
relieve any one of the idea that  
we are not on the fence on any  
point or plank in the Chicago  
platform.

It was stated at the council  
meeting Monday night that those  
who favored the reduction of  
salaries were the scrip holders  
and judgment creditors of our  
city. We feel that this is a slap  
at the intelligent voters of our  
city, the majority of whom are,  
and always have been, in favor of  
a reduction of salaries. If it can  
be proven to us that the scrip  
holders and judgment creditors  
and, by the way, the outstanding  
scrip is mostly that which is in  
the hands of the city's officers, or  
was issued to them, can be en-  
hanced in value, we will say the  
scheme was wrong. However, if  
the council will follow the plan  
suggested, there is no reason why  
scrip should appreciate. Our city  
is in need of street lighting. Our  
city is in need of many other im-

provements, which can be made  
by the council, and can be paid in  
scrip. With the reduction we  
have, we might say an available  
balance, at least our expenditures  
will not exceed our income by  
several thousand dollars. Cannot  
this balance be used in improv-  
ing the city? Certainly. Why,  
then, should the assertion be  
made that the reduction is in  
favor of scrip manipulators and  
judgment creditors? If the coun-  
cil does its duty we can improve  
our city and not burden it further  
by increasing its floating indebted-  
ness. We are sure that the re-  
duction made will react to the  
advantage of the city's interests,  
assertions like the one made at  
the council meeting to the con-  
trary notwithstanding.

## Reforms in City Affairs.

Waco, Tex., is in the midst of  
a municipal reform movement.  
While the conditions at Waco  
are entirely different than in Eu-  
reka Springs, and while in that  
city charges of bribery and cor-  
ruption are brought against the  
office holders, this condition does  
not exist here; but still there is  
room for reform here. There are  
many reforms that can be insti-  
tuted. This was begun in the  
council Monday night, when the  
salaries were reduced, which has  
made a saving to the city of  
many dollars.

The system of license collection  
is wrong. We favor the making  
of a semi annual report of all  
licenses collected and the number  
of people subject to license, thus  
giving the council a chance to  
know whether all who are subject  
to license are paying the same.

We favor the abolishment of  
the position of a second police  
man, and instead make him a  
street commissioner, with no  
other duties than to see that  
streets and public grounds are in  
good condition.

We favor a first class lighting  
system for our city, on the best  
terms it can be secured, and this  
should not be delayed.

We favor a strict sidewalk or-  
dinance rigidly enforced.

We favor an ordinance making  
it necessary to secure from the  
council a building permit when-  
ever anyone desires to erect build-  
ings of any kind.

We favor an auditing commit-  
tee from the council being ap-  
pointed, whose duty will be to  
audit the accounts of all city  
officers at stated periods and re-  
port to the council.

These are a few of the reforms  
we advocate; and, one thing more,  
we think the council in the past  
have been lax in their vigilance;  
did not pay sufficient attention to  
whether the duties of other offi-  
cers were properly performed or  
not. We think that the council  
should be very watchful and  
exact from all officers a strict  
performance of their duty.

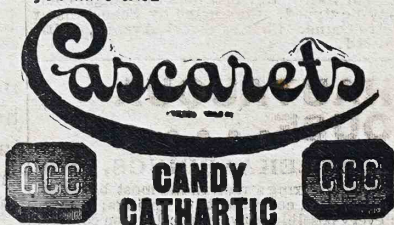

## Awful.

With his face and body terribly scarred by receiving the contents of a loaded shot-gun, and bearing the marks of a dozen knife thrusts. George Lawson, the well-known deputy marshal, stepped off the south-bound Cannon Ball train this morning.

He had just passed through the most dangerous experience of all his eventful career, and the only wonder is that he is alive today. To use his own words: "I was a fool to take such risks and I deserve to have been killed."

For weeks, Mr. Lawson has been out after a certain noted criminal, about whose case he declines to talk at the present time. During the last few days, he received a pointer that the man he wanted was hiding in a certain spot near Eureka Springs. A day or so ago, he went up there and found the story confirmed. His man was there.

Last night, Mr. Lawson buckled on his six-shooter and shouldered his Winchester. In searching for the man, Mr. Lawson ran into an ambuscade of his enemies one of whom fired at him point-blank in the face. The shot scattered all over his cheeks, nose and chin, but the greatest miracle none of it entered his eyes, or he would have been blind today. Seeing that this did not finish Lawson and that the plucky deputy was ready for a fight, another of the three men jumped on him with a knife and cut his face and breast in a horrible manner. When Mr. Lawson reached town today, his face was covered with blood and his shirt front gave gory evidence of the desperate attempt made upon his life. Although greatly overpowered he made a gallant fight and escaped with his life.

"I shall not go out until I get thoroughly fixed up," said Mr. Lawson this afternoon.—Fort Smith News.

A wire fence was repaired in the vicinity of the scrap today.

The reports of the fight between U. S. Marshal Hammack, J. W. Freeman and Granville Phillips and his moonshining gang, show that Phillips was severely wounded. The fight took place about sun-up yesterday, about six miles south of Carrollton, at what is known as Denton Cove. The still, which was just ready for firing, was totally destroyed. Hammack opened fire with a double-barrelled shot gun, and succeeded in wounding Phillips in the knee, hip, through the neck and the right side. Phillips called a physician and the same reports say that he is in a critical condition.


