## HELD A SESSION.

Kentucky Democratic Members Final-  
ly Got Together.

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 3.—The  
democratic members of the legis-  
lature yesterday effected a regu-  
lar organization for the first time  
since the swearing in of Gov.  
Goebel.

A secret session of the members  
of both houses was held in one of  
the parlors of the Capitol hotel,  
at which the election of William  
Goebel as governor, and J. C. W.  
Beckham as lieutenant governor,  
was reaffirmed, first in separate  
sessions of the house and senate,  
and afterward in joint session.

The session which lasted for  
nearly two hours was kept as  
secret as possible for fear of pos-  
sible interference.

Though none of those who at-  
tended the caucus cared to dis-  
cuss the matter, it seemed to be  
well understood among the demo-  
cratic members of the legislature  
that the session at London will  
be ignored altogether by them  
and that no democrat will attend  
"until compelled to do so."

It was practically decided that  
no formal demands will be made  
to hold sessions of the legislature  
in the state house by the demo-  
crats in a body, who will, how-  
ever, continue to hold sessions at  
some convenient place until the  
political atmosphere has cleared.  
This plan of action was decided  
on to forestall any attempt on the  
part of the republicans to arrest  
them and compel their attendance  
at London, which action accord-  
ing to the democratic view has  
been determined on by Gov.  
Taylor.

If arrests are attempted resist-  
ance will be made by the demo-  
crats, either to arrest, or to at-  
tending the session at London,  
should they be arrested.

It was determined that all acts  
of violence should be avoided, and  
that the battle for supremacy  
hereafter should be fought out in  
the courts.

Nevertheless the situation to-  
night is regarded as grave by  
members of both parties, and no  
one is willing to forecast the re-  
sult of the anticipated clash of  
authority between Gov. Taylor  
and the state courts.

Some action is expected at the  
session Monday in regard to offer-  
ing a reward for the arrest and  
conviction of the would-be assas-  
sin of Gov. Goebel, of \$50,000.

## BOER FORCES MOVING.

A Fresh Attack is Expected at Any  
Time.

London, Feb. 3.—Heliograms  
flashed from Ladysmith three  
days ago say that the Boer in-  
vestment lines were thinning and  
that the besiegers were moving  
in force toward the Tugela, indi-  
cating that a collision was ex-  
pected there.

This intelligence bears out the  
other signs that General Buller  
purposes a fresh attack. The  
war office continues to reveal  
nothing of what has happened in  
Natal.

Without exception the military  
critics regard with dismay the  
prospects of a renewal of the as-  
saults unless General Buller has  
been heavily reinforced; and  
there is nothing to indicate that  
this is the case.

Lord Kitchener has been  
traveling from army to army in  
northern Cape Colony and Gen.  
French, by instructions, is now  
in Cape Town consulting with  
Lord Roberts. Large engineer-  
ing constructions are proceeding  
at Modder river, suggesting that  
Lord Methuen's fortified camp  
has been selected as the base  
from which to invade the Free

State. The cost of the war to  
the end of the fiscal year, March  
1, is estimated at £30,000,000 or  
\$150,000,000.

Mr. Wyndham's remarkable de-  
claration in the house of com-  
mons is that Great Britain will have  
in a fortnight 180,000 regulars in  
South Africa, 7,000 Canadians  
and Australians and 26,000  
South African volunteers, is re-  
ceived with wonderment of this  
total of 213,000 troops, with 452  
guns, all are now there, with the  
exception of about 18,000 that  
are afloat. Beyond comparison  
this is the largest force Great  
Britain has ever put into the  
field. At the end of the Crimean  
war she had scraped together  
80,000 men. Wellington at  
Waterloo had 25,000 men.

## HIS TENDER HEART.

The address of Governor Jones to the people of Arkansas, declaring his candidacy for the United States senate, is particularly interesting only as to its expression on expansion. But his remarks on the pardon proposition are of consequence, and it is almost pathetic to follow his defense on the plea that his constitution is such that he "cannot turn a deaf ear to the tears and entreaties of heart broken women and children." This is unfortunate for the governor of a state, for men commit the blackest of crimes who have relatives with a capacity for shedding tears. Indeed, the worse a crime the more reason relatives have for grief; and the philosophy of Governor Jones' reasoning would lead us to believe that he measures guilt of a condemned man by the suffering of his relatives rather than by the evidence presented in court.

"If I have done well in the discharge of my other duties," says the governor, "and have shown sufficient intelligence and wisdom to properly conduct the office of governor, a humane disposition towards unfortunate men and women cannot disqualify me for a proper performance of the duties of senator, because senators do not have the pardoning power."

The governor must have known of his tenderness toward criminals when he solicited and accepted the office of governor. He did not shrink from it on that account, nor did he announce his policy in advance. Had he done so he might not have been given the opportunity to exercise his confessed failing in the executive chair of Arkansas. And who knows but that he may have some other constitutional defect concealed about his person which might become manifest in the atmosphere surrounding a United States senator? It is true that senators do not have the pardoning power; but they have other powers infinitely more important, and a man who confesses his incapacity for duties belonging to the governorship is hardly a proper man to elevate to a position of more responsibility.

There is a peculiar thing about this inherent tenderness of Governor Jones, in that it appears to have a decided leaning toward violators of the liquor laws. It is possible that there are more "tears and entreaties" connected with a conviction of that character than with others, but in which respect it differs from ordinary lawbreaking so far as justice of punishment is concerned, deponent sayeth not. If we are to accept the governor's defense, we must conclude that there is a peculiar affinity between this class of lawlessness and the lachrymal glands of relatives to the parties concerned.

It is suspected in this quarter that the people of Arkansas are not so tender hearted as our governor, and that they are likely to turn a deaf ear to his entreaties for the senatorship, even though they be supplemented by a flood of tears as profusely shed as those from Niobe of old.

## TO TAX COLONIES.

St. Louis Republic

For the purpose of reaping the fullest possible syndicate harvest of commercial profit from Puerto Rico and the Philippines, the Ways and Means Committee of the National House of Representatives has decided that they may be governed as colonies and thereby be deprived of certain advantages otherwise pertaining to their new status.

## This ruling makes it feasible

to place discriminating tariff duties against these islands, which could not be done under the provisions of that section of the constitution making customs and revenue laws uniform throughout the United States. In other words, they are not territory of the United States within the meaning of that section of the Constitution. They are territory for revenue only, so to speak.

It begins to look as if we propose to outdo the monarchial land-grabbing powers of the Old World in the matter of exacting tribute from conquered peoples. Puerto Rico, whose natives hailed our flag with joy, and celebrated in their churches the signing of the peace protocol on August 12, 1898, which transferred their allegiance to this government, will be a principality subject to the syndicates. It will not come into the full enjoyment of the Americanism which it welcomed so touchingly. It will be an instrument for trust profit, taxed for the trusts in whatever manner the trusts direct. The Filipinos, deprived of that liberty which they had fairly won from Spain, will be governed by force as an American colonial possession and compelled to swell the trust revenues as the trusts see fit.

This is anything but good Americanism—it is, instead, imperialism of the purest description. We will govern these people as we please. We will deny them the blessings of liberty and American citizenship as we please. We will despoil them as we please. Why not? They are our subjects, not our equals, even if we did once declare that all men are born free and equal. The imperial plan for colonial control is now confessed. How do Americans like it as an American policy?

The gas contained is 28.52 cubic inches in each gallon of water. 

SEC. 2. That Ordinance No. 256 passed and approved the 16th day of October, 1899, "entitled an ordinance condemning and appropriating certain parts of lots owned by one J. W. Allen, situated on Main Street for the

purpose of widening and straightening said street" and all ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.

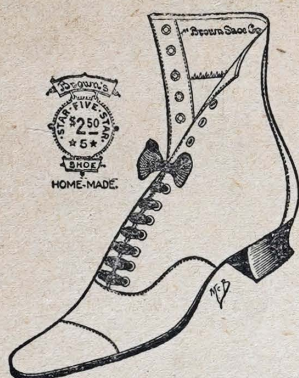

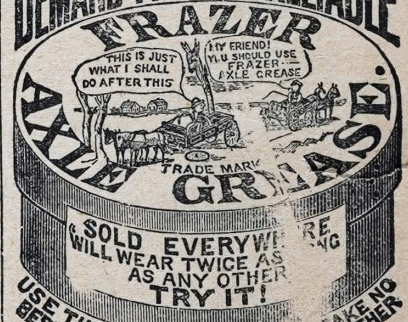
