A GRAND AFFAIR.

Opening of the Season at the Crescent Hotel.

BRILLIANT BALL AT NIGHT.

A petition was circulated today among the ministers of the city against opening a saloon in the Rice building, and is creating quite a sensation. The petition reads:

"We, the undersigned members of the Ministers' Alliance, of Eureka Springs, do hereby respectfully enter our protest, in the name of decency and for the daughters and children of our city, against the opening of the new saloon building in the Rice building on Spring Street.

"Said saloon will not only be a pitfall to our young men, but it will prove odious to every refined citizen and visitor, and to every lady in passing.

"If such places of iniquity are allowed in our city at all, common decency suggests that they be located where our wives and daughters, to say nothing of others will not be compelled to come under their influence. Houses of ill-fame are forced to seek secluded quarters, then why allow the saloon, which is the breeder of all the vices, to set itself up where every lady has to pass in order to visit the springs, the real estate offices, the stores, the post office, etc? It cannot but occur to every respectable citizen that the saloon in question, located where it is, is a reflection on our fair city, and can but prove offensive to hundreds who enter our gates in quest of health and pure surroundings.

STATE NEWS.

Clarksville—The Knights of Pythias will hold a district meeting at this place in the near future.

Texarkana—The oil mill here has closed down for the lack of cotton seed. Some seventy-five men will be laid off until the season opens again. Many of them will find employment elsewhere.

Van Buren—The cantaloupe growers of Crawford county are beginning to make arrangements for planting this year's crop, and will soon meet in Van Buren for the purpose of outlining their plans for disposing of same.

Jonesboro—The election which was held in this city to determine the wishes of property owners with regard to sewers resulted disastrously to the sewers. The vote stood 1,680 against and 375 for sewers.

Springdale—Mrs. S. A. McElrath received news that her son, Earl W. McElrath, had been sentenced to eighteen months' confinement for being absent without leave. He was a member of company H, Sixteenth infantry, and was doing duty in the Philippines. He is now in San Francisco.

Clinton—Below town the people are having the worst sort of measles. In the family of Mr. Dave Dempsey six have died within the last eighteen days, Mr. and Mrs. Dempsey, a daughter and son, and two of their grandchildren. Several others are having a most serious time of it.

Mountain Home—Thomas Lackey has been taken to Little Rock to serve a five year sentence for the killing of Thos. Hamilton last summer, the supreme court having affirmed the decision of the lower court. Milton Lackey, who also received the same sentence, died in jail while the case was pending in the supreme court.

Batesville—Through the efforts of Postmaster W. P. Jones Batesville will be one of the six stations in Arkansas where one or more free delivery routes will be established by the department. The other points are Newport, Beebe, Stuttgart, Clarksville and Russellville. An agent will be here at an early date to look over the ground and decide upon the route and the territory to be covered.

MINERAL CHIPS.

Notes of the North Arkansas Zinc and Lead Fields.

Prof. Opperman, a distinguished geologist, will begin an exploration of the mineral country this week.

The Cave Creek country is producing some wonderful developments in zinc. It promises to be one of the richest known.

T. Burton Everett & Co., of Boston, Mass., have purchased 22,000 acres in the Omaha locality, and will put fifty experienced miners at work soon. A modern mill will be erected.

A club of Frisco engineers has leased ten acres adjoining the Gloria mine.

On Monday, four men will be put to work, opening up the Holder property, mouth of Pedro branch, Crooked Creek, this county. The Holder is 208 acres in extent and is situated in section 2, township 18, range 18. The working force will be doubled as the opening proceeds.—Harrison Times.

The Buford Mining Co., is sinking a shaft on the Earl property, south of the Commercial mine, and has struck jack at a depth of six feet from the surface. The Gold Standard. Sorrell and the Big John are showing up in good shape, and their owners are uncovering more and better mineral than ever. The posts are all set for the telephone line from Buffalo on White river to the Rush creek mines, the wire is to arrive in a few days and will be set up at once.—Baxter county Citizen.

Ten teams will start for Eureka Springs in a few days to bring two boilers of 8000 tons each for the Hines' crusher to be erected about three miles east of town. The lumber for the crusher is now being prepared by a saw mill on the ground; rock and lime for the foundations are ready for the masons, and the work will be commenced and pushed as soon as the weather settles.
