



Postmaster Rosewater is work ing on a scheme whereby mail different parts of the city.

Under the postal laws and regulations Eureka Springs is not entitled to the free delivery system, and Mr. Rosewater hopes to formulate what is called than are being made here; and the paid delivery system, by which anyone by paying a nominal sum can have their mail delivered at their homes once every day, or twice, as the occasion may demand. It will be run the same as the free delivery system in other cities, with a small compensation added for the corriers. Mail boxes will be put up in different parts of the district where mail is delivered, for the accommodation of the patrons of the system, from which the mail will be taken up once a day,

This will be a great convenience to everybody and a great many citizens as well as visitors have signified their willingness to patronize the enterprise. The scheme has been practiced in many cities through the country and has given satisfaction generally wherever tried, and Mr. Rosewater should receive the support of all patrons of his office in his effort to better the mail service here.

He is also having blank books made in which to register the names of all visitors in the city and where they are located, which will help the clerks in the office very materially in placing the mail received for them. We wish Mr. Rosewater success in his enterprise and it should be hailed with delight and patronized by everybody in the city, as the cost of the deliveries will be
