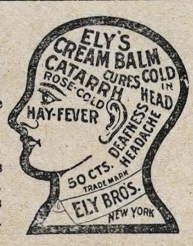

THE BRITISH ADVANCE.

Stromberg and Other Important Points Occupied.

London, March 6.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Roberts:

Osfontein, March 6.—Gatacre occupied Stromberg yesterday. The lines of railway north and west will now be repaired. Clements is at Joubert's siding station, beyond Colesberg. The Duke of Marlborough, with the Oxford company of imperial yeomanry, has left Cape Town for Nauport. Buller reports that Natal is now practically clear of the enemy and that he cannot hear of any formed body of them anywhere. The Boers left some ambulances full of their sick, from which mules had been taken for transport service.

According to Boer prisoners, another important British success will cause President Steyn to flee to Pretoria, leaving a provisional government at Bloemfontein, which is likely to make peace overtures.

Spencer Wilkinson in the Morning Post says: "From the silence of Lord Roberts we may infer that his army is again busily engaged in the continuance of his operations. It is hardly likely that with previous experience in fording rivers at the wrong places, that the relief force which left Kimberley for Mafeking will try to cross at Fourteen Streams, seeing it can as easily cross at Barclay or some other point, and it is impossible that any Boer army in the neighborhood is large enough to guard the whole stretch of the river between Fourteen Streams and Barclay."

The Morning Leader says: "Of one thing we may be certain, Cecil Rhodes, who owns South Africa, has determined that the annexation of the republics will not bring the lasting peace which our imperialists prophecy. Mr. Rhodes is so sure that he has prepared to set to work at once on the fortification of Kimberley. We incline to think that Mr. Rhodes is preparing for a possible armed conflict with the imperial forces, which he fought at the polls and in parliament until 1895. He is preparing to resist any attempt on our part to interfere actively in South African affairs, either in the interest of the Dutch elector, whose vote is already threatened, or of the Kaffir laborer, who seems doomed to virtual slavery. It is not indeed an extravagant hypothesis, Rhodes has constantly maintained a policy of 'Africa for the African,' and on his lips the latter word is synonymous with the financier. He will be loyal to the English flag just so long as it continues to be a valuable commercial asset."

WHITTAKER ON TRIAL.

Now in Court For Shooting Governor Goebel.

Frankfort, Ky., March 6.—A crowd which packed the Franklin county circuit court room gathered today to hear the examining trial of Harlan Whittaker, of Butler county, the farhand suspected of being implicated in the murder of Goebel.

The charges were changed from malicious shooting to murder. Whittaker was nervous.

Thirteen witnesses, all summoned by the commonwealth, were called. The first witnesses sworn were the men who had been concerned in the arrest of Whittaker on the morning of the assassination.

KENTUCKY AGAIN.

Republicans Shipping Arms to the Mountain Country.

Frankfort, Ky., March 6.—Shipments of guns, ammunition and military paraphernalia from the arsenal here to London continued today. A full carload of material left yesterday. Republican leaders deny that Taylor is preparing to issue a call convening the legislature at London in extra session and say the guns are being shipped there to prevent democratic officials getting hold of the state arsenal.

STATE NEWS.

Casa—There is a move on foot to build a \$2,500 school building at this place.

Prescott—On account of the smallpox in Nevada county the regular term of the circuit court has been postponed indefinitely.

Siloam Springs—Some capitalists from Buffalo, N. Y., are leasing land near Siloam Springs for the purpose of prospecting for oil.

Searcy—Sam P. Park of this city has bought the J. H. Yarnell & Co., bankrupt stock of goods, paying 67½ cents on the dollar for same.

Fordyce—"Bill" Malcolm of this place shot at John Orton of Kingsland with a revolver, striking him in the forefinger of the left hand, inflicting a slight flesh wound.

Ola—There has been expended in improvements at Ola over \$200,000 in the past six months. An average of fifty carloads of lumber are shipped from here each week and at least \$5,000 paid out monthly for railroad ties.

Texarkana—Justice Henry's court convicted the bosses of the gang of men arrested for working on the Sabbath and dismissing the cases against the others. There were four convictions and thirty-five dismissals.

Clarendon—It seems that a gang of burglars and safe blowers are operating in this part of the state. Brinkley, Clarendon, Holly Grove and Stuttgart have all been visited and safes have been cracked at Clarendon and Holly Grove.

Rogers—F. M. Seamster, general manager of the Berry Growers' Association of Avoca, reports the prospects good in his locality for a very fair crop of strawberries; his estimate is 75 per cent of a crop. The vines are looking healthy, strong and vigorous.

Hot Springs—It is probable that Sam Jones and Rev. Geo. R. Stewart, the most noted evangelists of the day, will come to Hot Springs in May or June and hold a series of meetings. They are now in correspondence with Dr. Julien C. Brown, pastor of Central church, regarding the matter.

Fort Smith—The saloon men who disregarded the Sunday ordinance recently, appeared either in person or by proxy in Judge Freer's court, and with one exception, entered pleas of guilty. They were all treated alike, no favoritism being shown, and a fine of \$25 was then entered against each of their names.
