THE FORTNIGHTLY.

First Meeting of the Year's Work Held Last Night.

Last evening, at the home of Mrs. Vincent, at the Chautauqua House, occurred the initial meeting of the Fortnightly club for this year.

Many of the members were present and gave interesting two-minute talks upon the subjects assigned them in the program and a very profitable evening was spent in instructive discussion. Mrs. M. R. Regan, vice president, paid a tender tribute to the absent president, Mrs. Chas. E. Davis, in opening the program. Mrs. Regan's address follows in full:

Though still in our midst, she is confined to her bed, where through all the last eight months, she has shown that rare Christian courage and fortitude so characteristic of her, which we hope will finally triumph over exhausted nerves. She would have thoroughly enjoyed this Century meeting, for she is a woman who takes an intense pleasure in every triumph of the spirit of progress.

In giving a hurried glance over the most prominent events of this century, as we must tonight, from whatever standpoint it is regarded, its history is marvelous. HIS FIRST SERMON.

Elder Sam Eaton Preaches to Green Forest Church.

It was a well filled house and fairly well behaved audience that greeted Elder Sam Eaton of Eureka Springs at Green Forest church on last Sunday night to hear this young gentleman deliver his first sermon.

For the most part the audience was not aware of the fact that they were assembling to hear a sermon from which a young man was to date the commencement of his ministerial career, but no one had any occasion for disappointment on that account. The young man preached a sermon that would have been creditable to men who have grown gray in the cause. Mr. Eaton is a polished scholar, a clear headed, fluent speaker, and makes a splendid appearance before his auditors. If his Green Forest sermon is to be taken as a standard for his ministerial career there can be no doubt but that he is one of the coming successful ministers of the state. He spoke from John 13:34, his subject being "The New Commandment."

Mr. Eaton is 29 years old and a son of Elmer Z. T. Eaton, now of Eureka Springs, but who had until about a year ago been one of the leading lights of the Baptist faith of Southwest Missouri. The young man was licensed to preach by the First Baptist Church of Eureka Springs on Wednesday night of last week. Although a brand new preacher, he is not a stranger to church work. He has been an active member for several years past, and was at the late Baptist association at Green Forest placed upon the County Missionary Board. It was in connection with his duties in this position that Mr. Eaton came to Green Forest. The church organization here had withered away until not even a meeting had been held for several months. The young order took the matter in hand and succeeded in securing enough pledges to pay for the services of a pastor for at least once a month during next year when augmented by a like amount which he hopes to secure from the State Missionary Board; thus demonstrating that he is not only an able preacher of the gospel, but an excellent field worker as well.

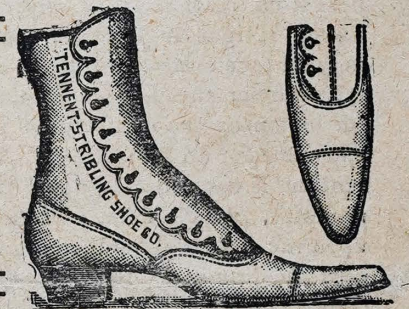

Government by Committee.

It is accounted a great merit in the House of Representatives that one of the important annual appropriation bills, carrying some twenty-five millions of dollars, was passed finally within three hours of its presentation by the committee, or about the time required for the clerk to read it rapidly. The member having the bill in charge particularly complimented the house upon the evidence of discipline and unquestioning faith.

The boast of Speaker Reed, says the Philadelphia Times, that the House of Representatives is not a deliberative body, has been well justified at this session. Measures of great importance have been put through, one after the other, just as reported, with the most hurried consideration, and the ideal of the leaders is attained when the House simply indorses the conclusions of the committees.

The practical advantages of this mode of legislation are obvious and the actual results are probably better, in most instances, than when the House attempts to tinker the bills reported to it. So large a body as the house now is cannot give the special consideration to special subjects that is usually given by the separate committees, and the army bill is a recent example of a measure that had most of its merits destroyed by amendments.

The drawback to this system of government by committees is that it releases individual members from responsibility without fixing it upon anybody that can be held accountable to the country. Under the British system, for instance, the ministry is responsible for all legislation. Attention is concentrated upon the ministry, which stands or falls upon the approval or disapproval of its leading measures. But our congressional committees are for the most part unknown to the public. They form an agency of government that is outside the constitution. There is no way to get at them, and no direct way to make known the public judgment upon any particular measure, except in the general and abstract judgment, from time to time, upon some salient policy of the party in power.

Washington Centenary.

There was no historic precedent for a nation starting out, as the United States did, with a complete scheme of government made to order for the occasion. Equally unprecedented was the establishment of a made-to-order "capital" for the young nation. We can see now that the creation of a Federal city, exempt from State jurisdiction, was one of the many wise inventions of that wise political epoch, and so many towns have been started upon paper since that we have forgotten how wild a venture it was that established the seat of

government at Washington one hundred years ago.

Americans in the early part of the century resented the humorous comments of foreigners who visited this embryonic metropolis, but the wonder now is that anybody could have spoken of it with a straight face. There is not a boom town on the prairies that is not infinitely better supplied with all the necessities and luxuries of civilized life than was this speculative settlement on the Potomac when the Congress met there first and the President took up his residence there. To be sure, it measured by our modern standards, the municipal improvements of Boston, New York and Philadelphia at that time were of a primitive sort; but Philadelphia was an abode of European luxury contrasted with the wilderness in which the office of government camped out in 1800.

Nor did the actual growth of Washington, for a half century or more, compare with that of many prairie towns of far less promise. It is still within memory when Pennsylvania avenue was a country road and the whole aspect of the city that of a straggling and neglected village. The modern development of Washington began after the civil war, and while much yet remains to be done for its perfection, it is already one of the few really beautiful cities in America, and the far seeing judgment of those who first platted the city of magnificent distances is justified after a hundred years.

The official celebration of this centenary should serve to direct attention to the real claims which Washington has upon the interest and the pride of all Americans and upon the intelligent and liberal care of Congress. The opportunity exists as it does nowhere else to make Washington in all respects, as it already is in many respects, a model city and a pattern for emulation both in aesthetic dignity and in the multifarious details of municipal administration.

THE MINING FIELD.

Notes Gathered From Over the North Arkansas District.

Baxter county has a mine that resembles the famous Morning Star of Marion county. A very large volume of zinc ore is exposed in blasting away the face of a bluff, on what is known as Rice mountain.

Samples of the drillings exhibited this week by J. H. Bartelles from his property on Clear Creek, Searcy county, show a good grade of carbonate, two feet of which has been struck at a depth of 40 feet. This is the second hole put down on this property by the Allen drill, and in the other 7 1 2 feet of jack was struck at 62 feet down. This land is 18 miles southeast from Harrison.—Times.

Claims Leaving New England.

Over the greater part of the New England coast the supply of claims has suddenly diminished to an extent which has become alarming. Extensive areas which four or five years ago produced great numbers of claims are now practically barren. The explanation is simply that the demand has increased at such a rate that too large a number of the natural "seed" claims have been removed and extinction suddenly follows.

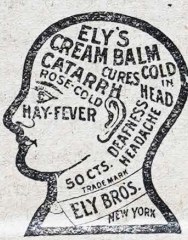
