## Ordinance No. 388

Entitled an ordinance providing for the submission, to the qualified electors of the city of Eureka Springs, Ark., at an annual city election on the first Tuesday in April 1905, the question of annexation to the corporate limits of the city, N. E. 1/4 of the N. E. 1/4 of Sec. 16, 20, N. R. 26 W. 20, N. R. 26 W. Known as the "Fraker Forty Acres," Carroll county, Arkansas.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of Eureka Springs, Ark.:

Section 1. That, whereas, it is deemed expedient by the City Council and to the best interest of the city of Eureka Springs, to extend the corporate limits of said city an annex thereto the N. E. 1/4 of the N. E. 1/4 of Sec. 16, Twp. 20, N. R. 26 W., known as the "Fraker Forty Acres," Carroll county, Arkansas, so as to extend the Water and Sewer systems of said city and to improve and better the sanitary condition of the city and said territory, and for the extension of proper police protection and regulation of said territory and for other good and sufficient reasons; it is hereby ordered by the City Council that the question of annexing said territory to the corporate limits of said city, and to be made a part of said city, be submitted to the qualified electors of said city, at the annual election to be held in said city on the first Tuesday in April, 1905, the same to be voted upon at said election by the qualified electors of said city.

Sec. 2. That there shall be placed upon the tickets used in said election, the words, "For the annexation of the ne 1/4 of the ne 1/4 of Sec. 16, Twp. 20, N R 26 w. and "Against the annexation of the ne 1/4 of the ne 1/4 of Sec. 16, Twp. 20, N R 26 w." And the mayor and the city clerk are hereby directed to file with the county election commissioners a certified copy of this ordinance, and ask that the above "For" and "Against" said annexation be placed upon the municipal ticket used at said election. And if a majority of the votes cast upon the question of annexation shall be in favor of such annexation, the city attorney is hereby directed and ordered to take all legal and necessary steps to have said territory properly and legally annexed to the corporate limits of the city, as the law provides for the annexation of contiguous territory to cities and towns of the State.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall be published in the "Daily Times-Echo," for 30 days prior to said April election and for four consecutive weeks in the "Weekly Flashlight," newspapers published in the city, the first insertion to be at least thirty days prior to said election and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

curious spring is located nine miles northwest of Eureka Springs and to reach it you have to travel over a winding rocky road. At the solicitation of Mr. and Mrs. Read, the genial host and hostess of the Blue Spring Inn, we visited them yesterday, and to say that the sight there well repaid us for the journey would be placing it mildly. The grand views of this mountainous country, as seen from the summit of the mountains over which you travel, are certainly as fine as can be seen anywhere. Were there no such goal as Blue Spring, these views would well repay one for taking the journey. For miles and miles you can look down over the valleys, where an occasional cleared field, with its showing of green, the result of some settlers arduous toil, adds the appearance of civilization to the rugged view of steep mountains, cliffs and forests.

On nearing the spring, you drive through a large gateway, then through a grove of large cedars and come in view of the rustic inn, where we were greeted by Mr. Reed, the horses cared for and one of the finest dinners one ever tasted awaited us. Through with this we were shown down the hillside a little way to where the spring, which is really the only source of a small river gushes forth.

Mr. Read has been making a great many improvements in a material way. Three or four hundred yards below the spring he has built a substantial dam, and now has quite a body of water on which will be found row boats. Below this dam he has builded a large grist mill, and a fully equipped saw mill. From here there has been constructed a road that leads to the railway near Beaver, about a mile and one-half distant.

The turbine wheel, run by the water from this spring can furnish
